Neighbors helping neighbors

UHA colleges continue community outreach

The four University Heights Association institutions continued their active community outreach and volunteer efforts through the holiday season, reaching out to a variety of organizations in the area.

The holiday season marked the 25th year for “Melodies of Christmas” – the WRGB/TV-6-sponsored event held at Proctors Theatre to benefit the Child Cancer Program at Albany Medical Center. The event has raised more than \$4 million since its inception.

More than 100 Albany Medical Center employees “adopted” children through the Department of Family and Community Medicine’s annual toy drive. Toys went to families being cared for through the Albany Medical Center’s AIDS Treatment Center, the Center City Mission on Central Avenue and the Koinonia Clinic in Arbor Hill.

The Schaeffer Library at Albany Medical College also sponsored a “food for fines” drive to benefit the Regional Food Bank of Northeastern New York. For three weeks, the library reduced or eliminated overdue fines in exchange for non-perishable food donations.

Two professional fraternities at ACP volunteered time during December.

The Kappa Epsilon Professional Pharmacy Fraternity conducted its annual fund drive to buy holiday presents for children and teen-agers at Parsons Child and Family Center. After raising money, Kappa Epsilon members purchased and delivered gifts to help brighten the season for our University Heights neighbor.

Albany Law School faculty, staff and more than 100 students donated holiday gifts and essential items to Albany Law School Clinic’s annual Adopt-A-Family project, making the holidays cheerier for six local families.

The Sage Colleges, in an effort sponsored by the office of Albany County Executive Mike Breslin, adopted a family with three children: a girl, age 7, and two boys, ages 8 and 12. Faculty and staff donated items from the family’s “wish list,” such as clothing, games, books, household items and gift certificates.

The Sage Student Services staff opted to forego its own “Secret Santa” gift exchange and contribute as a group, donating a Price Chopper gift certificate for more than \$100. All donations were collected by Albany County Social Services; they came to Sage with a small car, and had to return with a van!

Sage has participated in the program for more than five years. The effort is coordinated on both campuses by Dorcas McKinney, administrative assistant to the dean of Sage College of Albany.
