Crow dispersal efforts a success

You can now get to your car or take an evening stroll without fear of in-flight assault from the thousands of crows that were, until recently, an undeniable presence in our community.

Wildlife biologists with the United States Department of Agriculture, Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service, Wildlife Services, participated in a cooperative pilot program to explore effective non-lethal methods to reduce damage associated with a large urban American crow roost in a residential area of the City.

The accumulations of droppings and the associated smell and clean up costs were the primary concern expressed by local residents. Additional wildlife conflicts included the early morning noise created by this large concentration of crows and the potential threat to human health and safety related to disease transmission to people. The goal of the cooperative program was to change night roosting patterns of crows in the City of Albany through a bird hazing program and the management of traditional roosting sites to reduce conflicts

between people and crows

This program began Monday, January 9 and concluded Friday, January 13 on the University Heights campus and adjoining properties. The control methods were employed from approximately 3:30-7:30 p.m. each evening and 5:30- 8:00 a.m. each morning.

The non-lethal harassment methods used to disperse the crows included pyrotechnics, electronic guards, non-harmful lasers and amplified recorded crow distress calls. Several of these methods produce loud noises and flashing lights (similar to sirens and fireworks) that frighten birds and may have been heard or observed on and near campus.

As a result of the methods, only 85 of the original 25,000 crows remain in the area, according to Ken Preusser, District Supervisor with Wildlife Services. Continued surveys are being conducted by Wildlife Services. They continue to set up survey points in the pre-dawn hours to count the crows flying out of their roost in the morning. Spot treatments will be conducted if necessary.
